Legislative Updates

Council Member Calloway Advocates for Syphilis Awareness

Since the start of this year, the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) has raised concerns about the increase in cases of Syphilis. Syphilis is a sexually transmitted infection that can seriously affect the health of men, women, and infants.

In 2022, the U.S. surpassed the highest count of infections since 1950. In Michigan, Syphilis rates have risen, on average, 11% annually since 2012. MDHHS has reported a 25% increase between the years of 2020 and 2021 alone.

Detroit has the highest rate of Syphilis cases in the state. Council Member Calloway shares the concerns of the experts at MDHHS and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, who are sounding this alarm nationwide.

In recognition of these facts, Council Member Calloway is putting forth a resolution declaring April as "Syphilis Awareness Month" in the City of Detroit.

Council Member Calloway Supports Legislation Concerning Payday Loans

During Formal Session on March 19, Council Member Calloway shared her support of Senate Bill 632, which will regulate payday loans. Council Member Calloway congratulates Senator Sarah Anthony for successfully navigating this important legislation through the Michigan Legislature.

If passed by the Michigan House of Representatives, the legislation will limit payday lending rates to a cap of 36% annually, aligning Michigan with similar legislation enacted in 20 states and the District of Columbia.

Currently, those who borrow from payday lenders in Michigan pay as much as 300% annually. On March 11, 2024, SB 632 was reported out of the Committee on Finance, Insurance, and Consumer Protection.

On March 14, 2024, the entire Michigan Senate passed the legislation with bipartisan support. The legislation now moves to the Michigan House of Representatives for action. This legislation will be good for Detroit and the state of Michigan. Everyone should support this effort.


Council Member Calloway attends NLC Congressional City Conference

The brothers designed the online platform to create a safe digital forum for collectors and entrepreneurs to trade valuable fashion safely. Their desire to mitigate dangerous selling techniques used by scammers to steal and misrepresent items charged them to create a brick-and-mortar store to facilitate trades in a safe space.

Culture Detroit has significantly impacted the city of Detroit and has successfully helped entrepreneurs flourish in a fast-paced industry. The brothers have made it their mission to be good community partners by providing food and coat drives, back-to-school supply giveaways, and hosting events for major holidays.

Human Trafficking Advocacy Day

By: Thomaesa Bailey, Esq. On Tuesday, March 19, 2024, the Detroit Human Trafficking Task Force traveled to the Michigan State Capitol to host an Advocacy Day Against Human Trafficking. The advocacy day was organized to advocate for three legislative proposals that the task force believes will address human trafficking not only in the city of Detroit but also in the state of Michigan.



While in Lansing, task force members advocated for criminal record restriction for individuals who were trafficked as minors and forced to commit crimes while they were being trafficked. We advocated for a statewide law that would require hotels and motels across the state to post the human trafficking hotline number in their establishments. Additionally, we advocated for training grants to fund the creation and implementation of age-appropriate survivor and educator-led human trafficking training. In addition to advocating for these three legislative proposals, the Human Trafficking Task Force also educated state lawmakers and Capitol staff on the prevalence of human trafficking in the state. According to the National Human Trafficking Hotline,

Michigan ranked in the top 10 states in 2021 for human trafficking calls, with 295 cases of human trafficking identified involving 429 known victims. We also discussed the demographics of human trafficking victims, showing that it disproportionately impacts women and girls, many of whom are of color and from disadvantaged backgrounds. Additionally, we talked about the economic impact of human trafficking on the state and how human trafficking impacts families and communities. We wanted to impress upon the audience that each human trafficking statistic is tied to a story of a person who was taken from his or her family.

Supporting Black Men Vote

Black Men Vote aims to empower Black men, especially young Black men, to participate actively during elections. The organization provides education on the significance of voting and emphasizes its power in effecting desired changes in neighborhoods and communities. They complete this goal by going into neighborhoods, registering willing residents to vote, and starting conversations that further the discussion of Black men voting. We hope to partner with Black Men Vote through the Youth and Civic Engagement Task Force.



Senior Citizen Solid Waste Discount

The application period for the Senior Citizen Solid Waste Discount offered by the City of Detroit is July 1-September 15. Here are the details:

- Homeowners aged 65 and above with a Principle Residence Exemption on file are eligible for a discount.
- The Solid Waste Fee is \$250, with qualifying seniors receiving a \$125 discount.
- Annual reapplication is **not** required as long as ownership and residency are maintained.

Application instructions for the Senior Citizen Solid Waste Discount: Submit the completed Senior Citizen Application for Solid Waste Discount to the City of Detroit Treasurer's Office between July 1- September 15.

Grow Detroit's Young Talent Program


